

**Council Follow-Up**

Public Works staff spoke with Xochitl Paderes on February 4, 2009, regarding her request to Council for traffic calming measures. She requested traffic calming on Trinity Parkway, Mokelumne, Scott Creek, Cosumnes and Regatta. All of these streets are major collectors with no homes fronting the street; therefore, they do not qualify for traffic calming under our current guidelines. The Public Works Director suggested she submit an application and get on the waiting list. When her neighborhood is at the top of the list, staff will evaluate the neighborhood to determine if the streets qualify based on the guidelines at that time.

**Community Services**

The Youth Advisory Commission held its monthly meeting February 12. The Youth Advisory Commission will be working on their first-ever TeenFest, which is planned for May 30. The Commissioners are also working on future community service activities including working with Channel 97 to collaborate on public service announcements and volunteering at this year's Earth Day Festival in April.

The Youth Leadership Academy trip was held Friday, February 13. This month's topic was health care. The students spent the day at Kaiser Permanente's Stockton Facility where they were able to tour the facility and hear from a variety of different doctors. **Housing and Redevelopment Department**

On Tuesday, February 10th, staff implemented the City Council directive to open access to 75 monthly parking spaces in the City-owned parking garage beneath 400 East Main Street in Downtown Stockton. Monthly spaces are being made available for purchase to the general public at the standard rate of \$80 per month. The monthly parking spaces are leased on a month-to-month basis and may be reclaimed by the City with 30 days prior notice. Spaces may be reclaimed as needed to accommodate parking needs for new building tenants, current tenants or for other approved City purposes.

Applications for monthly parking will be available weekdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the CB Richard Ellis Building Management Office, in the first floor lobby at 400 East Main Street. Each application/payee may request up to a maximum of 10 parking spaces. On April 1, 2009 any spaces remaining from the original allocation of 75 will be offered without quantity limitation.

## Library

On February 3rd, Dave Rodrigues, the Astro Wizard, brought to the Tracy Branch Library a portable planetarium to introduce library patrons to constellations and other astronomical wonders. Sixty-seven patrons, adults and children, participated in this educational and fun program. After seeing and learning about the stars inside the planetarium the program continued outside where participants were able to look at the moon and the planet Venus through a telescope. Mr. Rodrigues' program offered an added bonus as participants were able to view a space ship, the International Space Station, as it passed over Tracy during the program letting everyone see astronomical science in action. This program is part of the continuing Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory's grant Science Series being presented at the Tracy Branch Library.

A pictorial presentation of African American men and women who came to California during the Gold Rush was made on Saturday, Feb. 7, at the Cesar Chavez Central Library. Around 15 people attended the event, offered by Sonora historian and author Sylvia Roberts. She signed a number of copies of her book, "Mining for Freedom: Black History Meets the California Gold Rush." Featured were not only miners and pioneer folk but others who found fortune and success in California.

The Margaret K. Troke Branch Library held a re-opening on Thursday February 5, 2009. Neighbors and other interested people came by to tell the staff how happy they were that the Troke Branch had reopened. Approximately 625 people came to check out and return materials, listen to an impromptu performance by Jean Claude Crhi and sample the cookies and lemonade. Mr. Crhi, a Troke customer, will have a complete performance of African Drumming at the Troke Branch on Tuesday, March 10 at 6 p.m. The Troke Branch has new hours, following the schedule change of January 1, 2009. Open hours are: Mondays and Wednesdays 10 a.m.- 6 p.m., Tuesdays and Thursdays 12 p.m. - 8 p.m., Fridays and Sundays 1 p.m.-5 p.m. and Saturdays 10 a.m.- 5 p.m.

On Sunday, February 8, 2009, the Margaret K. Troke Branch Library held a program to celebrate African-American History Month. Approximately 37 people attended the program, A Family Remembers *When We Were Colored* on Sunday. Ginger Rutland and Eva Fields, daughter and granddaughter of author Eva Rutland, discussed her book *When We Were Colored*. The author was also in attendance. *When We Were Colored* tells the story of what it was like to be the first black woman in many walks of life. The book was a finalist for the Benjamin Franklin Award.

Several Library staff participated in the San Joaquin A+ Rotary Read-In on Wednesday, February 11. Lloyd Jansen and Amy Faylor visited first graders at Fremont School. Alex Bailey and Suzy Daveluy visited kindergartners at Victory and Washington Schools, respectively. Staff shared their love of books and reading with students and donated 2 picture books to each class. A fun time was had by all.

In celebration of Valentine's Day, the Maya Angelou Branch Library hosted a craft program on Wednesday, February 11. Students from ages 8-15 gathered together to make a Friendship Flower craft. Library supporter Delia Dávila and daughters showed students how to wrap and decorate their three flowers; then the Dávilas provided each participant with a miniature vase to plant the colorful bouquets. Students were enthusiastic in their plans to give flowers to special friends and family members. The Friendship Flower craft program is also scheduled for the Fair Oaks Branch Library on Saturday, February 14.

## Peacekeepers

The program manager has been working with officials at Mule Creek Prison on a diversion program for youth that is facilitated by inmates who wish to help youth too avoid making the poor choices in life they made as youths. Community Health Action Team (CHAT) is aggressively focusing its efforts on approximately 1,058 vacant properties within the City.

Within the last week, the Graffiti Team removed 47,176 square feet of graffiti. Over 380 additional pieces of property were abated, including signal boxes and poles, mail boxes and public signs.

Scheduled inspections of two rental properties resulted in one failing the inspection. A Violation Warning Notice was sent to the property owner informing them of the existing violations. The remaining property was found to be vacant and foreclosed. Notices to Inspect were posted to 23 properties with inspections scheduled to begin on February 25, 2009.

A Patrol Sergeant observed the suspect involved in a hand-to-hand drug transaction. When he attempted to stop the suspect for further investigation, the suspect placed the suspected drugs in his mouth and attempted to chew and swallow them. The suspect was forced to the ground and spit out some of the drugs, which later tested presumptive positive for cocaine base. The suspect was booked into the County Jail.

Officers responded to the 2700 block of S. Madison on a report of a burglary in-progress. Officers checked the residence and found it had been broken into and items placed by the back door. The suspects apparently fled just as Officers arrived. Officers stopped a car leaving the area and detained the occupants; another Officer stopped a subject on Fairmont. Three subjects were transported to the Police Department and interviewed. All three suspects confessed to committing the burglary and were arrested.

Officers spotted a subject loitering in the 1400 block of E. Main. When they contacted the subject, he quickly walked away and threw a plastic cup containing approximately 1.06 grams of suspected crystal methamphetamine. As the Officers took Garcia into custody, they walked past a van occupied by three subjects drinking beer. Officers contacted the subjects and located a .25 cal auto handgun inside a box of beer and a loaded .25 cal magazine in the wallet of one of the subjects. All four suspects were arrested on various charges.

Traffic Officers conducted a DUI Checkpoint in the northbound lanes of Wilson, just south of Roosevelt; 285 cars passed through the Checkpoint. Officers arrested 3 drivers for driving under the influence; 23 citations were issued and 16 vehicles were impounded. Funding for the Checkpoint was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The victim was sitting in his car in the 300 block of S. Center, when the suspect walked up and engaged him in conversation. As they were talking, the suspect grabbed and jerked a gold chain off the victim's neck. Officers located the suspect in the 500 block of W. Sonora, and, after being identified by the victim, the suspect was arrested.

The victim went to a room in the 600 block of N. Wilson, intending to pay for sex. While in the room, Suspect #2 came up from behind him, held a knife to his throat and demanded his money. The victim threw his money on the ground and took off running. The victim was able to flag down a Police unit; Officers went to the location and arrested both suspects.

The victim was attempting to repossess a Ford F150 in the 4000 block of EWS Woods, when the owner/suspect exited the house with a shotgun and threatened to shoot the victim. The victim lowered the vehicle and the suspect asked a friend to drive the truck into the garage. While the responding Officer was talking to the victim, the suspect exited the house and was taken into custody without incident. The shotgun was located in a neighbor's trash can.

Officers stopped a vehicle at Ninth/Pock for a traffic violation; the driver was found to be unlicensed. Officers conducted an inventory search of the vehicle and located a loaded, sawed-off shotgun. A passenger was found to be in possession of 3.17 grams of rock cocaine. Both suspects were arrested on various charges.

The victim reported she witnessed her vehicle being stolen from her driveway in the 1300 block of N. Pershing. The responding Officer located the vehicle near the intersection of Hunter/Harding and attempted to stop it. The suspect lost control of the stolen vehicle and collided with a parked vehicle. The suspect attempted to flee on foot. The suspect was taken into custody a short time later and booked at the County Jail.

Officers conducted a checkout of a subject who was in the driveway of a vacant house in the 1300 block of Carlton. The suspect was found to be in possession of a loaded .38 caliber revolver and methamphetamine. When Officers checked the house, they located a second subject, who was arrested for trespassing. When Officers searched Suspect #1's vehicle, they located numerous stolen items. Both suspects were arrested.

The owner of a stolen vehicle located his vehicle near the intersection of Grant/Charter. The owner followed the vehicle until Officers arrived. Upon seeing patrol vehicles, the suspect attempted to drive off, but lost control of the stolen vehicle and collided with a fence and a power pole. Both occupants of the vehicle were arrested and booked into the County Jail.

A 20-year-old teller was working inside the Bank of the West at 7810 Thornton Road when the suspect walked up and handed her a demand note. The victim handed him a large amount of cash and the suspect then fled out of the business and drove off in his car. Moments later, the suspect collided with another vehicle at the intersection of Thornton/Pershing. The suspect offered the other driver money if she would not call the police as he had just robbed a bank. The other driver called the police who responded to the accident scene and arrested the suspect. The stolen money was found inside the suspect's jacket; the suspect was booked for robbery.

Forward Landfill is proposing to expand its current operation from 559 acres to 744 acres and from the existing 110' to 210' in elevation - according to an EIR Scoping Session held last week which was attended by staff from the Solid Waste & Recycling Division. Forward Landfill is owned by Allied Waste and is located on the west side of Austin Road, one-half mile south of the airport and within the County's jurisdiction. Forward Landfill officials said the expansion is a business move to increase capacity beyond its current year 2020 amount and to allow for more imported waste from outside of San Joaquin. Nearly 75% of the waste generated by the City of Stockton is currently disposed of at Forward Landfill (the remaining 25% is public self-haul disposal at County facilities). Under the current proposal there are no plans to build a waste diversion facility for recyclable materials. The purpose of the Scoping Session was to collect public comments and questions before publication of the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) which is anticipated to be released later this spring.

**City Manager's Message**

The City observed the holiday in honor of President Lincoln's Birthday.

I held my respective weekly meetings with the Mayor and Councilmember Fritchen. I held my regular meetings with: Dave Harzoff; and Laurie Montes and Joe Maestretti. Mayor Johnston and I met with Mike Locke, San Joaquin Partnership, Leroy Ornellas, Chair, San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors, Manuel Lopez, San Joaquin County Administrator, Brent Ives, Chair, San Joaquin Council of Governments (SJCOG), and Andy Chesley, SJCOG, regarding the Arch-Sperry Connector.

Ren Nosky, Guy Petzold, Mike Niblock, Jeff Willett and I discussed prison annexation. I attended the Council Budget/Finance/Economic Development Committee Meeting. Mayor Johnston and I met with City of Lodi representatives Councilmember Susan Hitchcock and City Manager Blair King regarding the agriculture separation zone between Stockton and Lodi. Mayor Johnston and I met with Leroy Ornellas, Chair, County Board of Supervisors, Steve Moore, County Sheriff, and Doug Wilhoit, Greater Stockton Chamber of Commerce, regarding the proposed prison hospital.

Dave Macedo, President, Stockton Firefighters' Local 456, and I held our regular meeting. Dianna Garcia, Laurie Montes and I met with Stephen Leonesio, President, SPOA, regarding furlough equivalent issues. I attended the San Joaquin County City Managers and County Administrator monthly meeting.
